march his squadron through the rigorous preparation for an ASEV reflects tremendous unit pride and mission focus," Richardson said. "While the ASEV evaluators won't formally inspect the 16 AS and the C-141, they can't help but be impressed with the total Team Charleston commitment to excellence."

Although the ASEV team arrives Tuesday, aircrew evaluations have been going on since October as 21 AF evaluators conducted "line checks" without notice. Evaluators have been show up at base operations worldwide where Team Charleston crews were transiting, join the aircrew and administer no-notice check rides.

To date, evaluators have accomplished more than 60 check rides. Once the team arrives, the evaluators will shift their focus to evaluations flown on local missions. Special emphasis will be placed on evaluations of our standardization and evaluation personnel and instructor force. The inspectors will also administer a closed-book evaluation to all available crewmembers to test their knowledge of emergency procedures, aircraft systems and

limitations, and command regulations.

Each year, the ASEV team compiles a list of higher headquarters' emphasis items pertaining to the enhancement of our mobility mission and crew force. These emphasis items stress conserving resources, increasing safety and ensuring aircrew members receive the best training possible.

Squadron and operations group standardization/evaluation, training offices and aircrew members have been working to prepare for this inspection; but it's not just an aircrew inspection.

The attitude displayed by every member of Team Charleston is invaluable in setting the tone for the inspectors—first impressions count, said Richardson.

"Charleston is blessed with tremendous leadership and airmanship talent," he said. "It's why we're so successful on a day-to-day basis and why, when the command has an extraordinarily challenging mission, it turns to the 437th. It's this level of superlative performance that I hope the ASEV evaluators will see and comment on throughout their visit."
